## **Forearm Crutches and Wheelchairs**


Unfortunately, not everyone can be accurately portrayed without some assistance.


Use the wheelchair or forearm crutches for children or adults, shown here, to get all members of your Stitch People portrait just right.


## **CRUTCHES**

For the crutches, I recommend completing the narrow stitches using a full X shape but doing so in half the horizontal space. (See diagram.)

This way, the crutches will look substantial but still thinner than the arm of the stitched people.









## **WHEELCHAIRS**

For a wheelchair, I think it is effective to portray the person sitting at an angle, so as to show the torso and legs more fully.

For the large wheel of the wheelchair, you can either fill the wheel in with a light or dark gray (as shown) or leave those squares empty to let the Aida fabric show through, highlighting the shape of the wheel in black, alone.





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
